New York State Women, Inc.'s mission has rightfully been modified to emphasize the word, *connect*. To connect is an active verb. It means to unite, to bind together, to join, link, yoke, or fasten together – as when one person reaches out to another, and that other person willingly receives that touch of connection. Buffalo, NY food pantry needs volunteers.

The Family Help Center, a nonprofit dedicated to the prevention of child abuse, operates a food pantry as part of its portfolio of services available to families in need. Food insecurity remains a constant for low income and underemployed households and, since the onset of the pandemic, the agency has seen the use of the pantry skyrocket. The number of people served has tripled over the past nine months with no end to the need and demand in sight.

Prior to the pandemic the pantry was totally operated by dedicated volunteers – primarily senior citizens – with great commitment and passion for the cause. Sadly, due to the pandemic this group of volunteers are unable to participate any longer.

The Center is in great need of new volunteers who have an interest in community service and have a few hours to spare each month. The work is on site at the Center and all socially distant health and safety measures are in place including a touch-free transfer of goods to participants.

I've been thinking a lot these past couple months about *connecting*, whether with family or friends or my fellow NYS Women, Inc. members. This past November and December have been especially tough.
